Welcome to Let's Adopt Indonesia!

I am proud to present Let's Adopt Indonesia's first annual report on the development of our programs in 2019.

With your generous support, we have saved and rehomed homeless and traumatized cats and dogs, and at the same time, put our efforts to raise awareness on the importance of spay and neuter. In this report, we share success stories of our accomplishments for animals in need and our spay and neuter activity throughout 2019. Your support enables our commitment to helping numerous animals in crisis, and we're truly thankful for it.

We regularly host monthly spay-neuter programs, taking place in Jakarta and Bekasi, also once in Semarang, Central Java. One of the best reflection of our spay and neuter activities was the August 2019 launch of Project Steril Bareng, a free TNR (Trap-Neuter-Return) program for stray cats with the help of crowdfunding and volunteers as a solution to reduce Indonesian stray cats' over-population and educate more people about the importance of spay and neuter. The great feedback and increasing public interest that we got from our spay-neuter program were the reasons why we think that it was the right time to make sure that it can become a continuous program, even in the future, to keep making impacts in reducing stray cats and dogs' overpopulation. Bringing support to pet owners and caring people who feed the less fortunate cats and dogs yet cannot afford to neuter them improves not only the health and safety of the vulnerable animals, but also the well-being of people, and the entire communities.

44.3K followers on Instagram, 28.7K on Facebook, and 7.2K on Twitter, an essential asset to our on-going education program. We reach out to pet owners and individuals using social media as an interactive tool to promote spay and neuter, pet adoption, animal welfare, and responsible ownership. In an effort to make sure that our vision can still be carried through to younger generations, we do a knowledge-sharing program in schools/campuses in order to raise awareness and interest in students. We also cooperate with them as a contributor to information that they need for school projects.

As COVID-19 affected both people and animals around the world, this challenging time calls for urgent measures for LAI. We need more support to raise funds for our spay and neuter programs to prevent unwanted litters, help protect against some serious health problems, and curbs undesirable hormone-related behaviors so we can create a safer community.

We believe that even during this hard time, we can still do something to make a difference for animals in need. Together, we can make it happen!



This section provides a detailed description of our activities throughout the years, up to 2019.

1. Spay and Neuter

Let's Adopt Indonesia has been actively and regularly doing the spay and neuter activities for the past two years. Starting with spaying and neutering 420 cats and 40 dogs in 2018, the number keeps increasing each year, reaching 1202 cats and 92 dogs in total by December 2019, due to the rising awareness of the society of the importance of spay and neuter.



We work together with Leo n Vets Clinic in Bekasi and Pet Love Center in South Jakarta for our spay and neuter programs.

One day, a stray cat came to our house and like usual we street-fed him and he was thin like a usual stray but also handicapped, missing a front paw, so he hopped with difficulties instead of walking. 

#ProjectSterilBareng

We launched a spay and neuter project called #ProjectSterilBareng, collaborating with other spay and neuter communities, namely Rumah Steril (Jakarta), Steril Donk!! (Jakarta), Soulcare.pet (Jakarta), Steril Malabar Bogor (Bogor), PKDI Malang (Malang), and Stray Cat Defender (Malang) in August 2019. #ProjectSterilBareng is a TNR program and charges no fees for the spay and neuter surgery.



The three first projects were done in Jakarta and Greater Jakarta area and the fourth in Malang, East Java. There was a lot of support from the communities and we were able to reach 77 in our first project, and the number increased by 16 on the second event. On the third and fourth events, 95 and 109 cats were spayed and neutered respectively. In total, we have made sure that 374 cats are now worry-free from unwanted pregnancies.

2. Rescue

As we focus more on spay and neuter activities, we have to reduce our rescue activities but still kept our rehoming activities going. In 2019, we rescued 11 animals and successfully rehomed 9 cats and 2 dogs. 4 animals, unfortunately, passed away before they got adopted, due to medical issues.

We have rehomed a total of 69 cats and 132 dogs since established in 2011.

Most of our rescued animals came in poor condition due to harsh living condition as strays and mistreatment from abandonment, such as:

Under-socialized

Abandoned or neglected pets and strays usually don't experience good socialization with humans and other animals which can create a dangerous situation for both parties. That's where our foster families stepped in. By helping our rescues to come out of their shell and learn to enjoy their second chance in life.

Most of them are not vaccinated

As most of our rescues are neglected/abandoned pets and strays, all of them have never been vaccinated against any disease. We concentrate on getting them into a better condition first before letting them recuperate and then getting them vaccinated.

Too young and weak to survive on their own

Many times we found animals alone and confused in dangerous places. Like Little Ollie here, she was found in a busy gas station. Dirty, sick, and emaciated, Little Ollie had no idea how to survive there as she was very young and weak.

Pregnant/with babies

Wendy was one of our neglect cases. She was abandoned in atrocious condition. Her former owner let her fend for herself in the neighborhood while Wendy still returned to the family every day. Pregnant, injured, and suffering from Demodex, she then gave birth to a litter but only 2 of them survived by the time we got to rescue her.

Stressed due to changes/abandonment

Neglected animals can get stressed, even after being rescued. Jimmy was only allowed to live in the garage by his former owner and he spent most of his days wandering around the neighborhood by himself, trying to find food as he was not given any by the so-called family. He was finally rescued when neighbors called us after noticing that he was getting thinner and sicker. When Jimmy arrived at our foster home, we noticed that Jimmy was wary, scared, and suspicious of strangers. He was also jumpy as he was not used to gentle touch.

Traumatized by harsh life on the streets

Life on the street was harsh for Veelie. The fact that hunting food was not that easy and being always on alert for psycho wench who might hurt her traumatized Veelie. Her rescuer had to spend days just to get her trust and finally took her in.

Neglected conditions such as matted fur, malnutrition, parasite-ridden

Rescued with tons of parasites and various skin diseases, Kelly was once a local monastery's favorite dog but when he began developing itchy red rashes due to Babesia (blood parasite), people began to get disgusted by the mere sight of him. The monastery then chained and left Kelly in neglected condition before deciding to throw Kelly out on the street when his skin disease got worse. Thankfully, we got there in time.

Various illnesses

Abandoned pets and strays are likely to suffer from illnesses that progress fast due to malnutrition and harsh living conditions. Leo was just a kitten when he contracted Chlamydia infection in one of his eyes. It ravaged his tiny emaciated body and ate away his eye. It had to be surgically removed by the time he was rescued, leaving him blind in one eye.

Serious medical issues

When Crystal was rescued from the streets, an in-depth veterinary check revealed a lot of things that went wrong in her body apart from her dirty and flea-ridden fur. She suffered a limp from patellar luxation which needs surgery to fix, coral stones were found in her digestion tract. She also suffered from an unknown skin disease that would leave bald patches on her body. Crystal lived for a while in our foster home and later passed away from progressive kidney failure.

Horrendous injuries due to human abuse

These cases are the top reason why we always emphasize on educating people about animal welfare. Patrick's story began when we received a report about a dog being chased by a madman with a machete. The dog was defending himself when the madman's son threw him stones and hit him with sticks. He bit the boy, in retaliation, the father cleaved Patrick's face almost in half!






Before After

Handicapped, either from birth or due to injuries

Gianna has no eyes; we were told that it was a hereditary condition due to irresponsible cross-breeding. She was likely thrown away because her breeder couldn't sell her as she was "defective". Gianna was found scavenging scraps of food among the filthy trash in a dumpster. Luckily, a caring security guard saw Giana and rescued her.

3. Rehabilitate

Let's Adopt Indonesia has no shelter, therefore our rescues live with foster families who take care and act as their guardians until the day they get adopted.

We provide many things besides food and shelter for our rescues – we work with foster families to prepare them for their new home with:

Veterinary care

As mentioned above, most of our cases came with severe neglect and medical issues. Some need lots of medication, some need emergency surgery, and some need specialized treatment. We help all of them the best we can to have better health.



Human socialization

To help our rescues adapt better to a new environment, we make sure that our cats and dogs get a good socialization experience with their foster human family first. This is the part where we can decide whether they are ready to be adopted, need more work, or are unsuitable for adoption.




Community socialization (for dogs)

After the rescued animals, especially rescued dogs, are comfortable with their own family, we encourage our foster family to take them to a public place and socialize with other animals and strangers. This will help them feel at ease in the public, learn basic public space etiquette, and fulfill their socialization needs.

Exercise and Games

We want our rescues to live a balanced life, so exercising and games are always part of their daily routine while being fostered.





Training

We work with foster families to make sure that our rescues get their basic training to make their new life easier like answering their name, toilet training, do's and don'ts, and basic commands. Foster families are welcome to help their rescues further with advanced training.

Grooming

A clean adoptee is a happy adoptee. Our rescues got a routine grooming session to make sure that they look their best. Routine grooming also helps us to detect if there are any physical problems that got overlooked.





4. Rehome

Rehoming is the last stage of our rescue program and we take it very seriously. We don't pass our rescues to just anyone, we adhere to strict adoption criteria to ensure our animals and their future families are a good match for each other. People who are interested in adopting from us must go through several screenings before we agree to let them live together for a 1-month try-out period with the cat/dog that they choose. When the adopter is not a perfect match for the rescued animal, we'll offer the family another rescued cat/dog that might be suitable for them if they still want to adopt. All our rescues are spayed/neutered prior to adoption.

In 2019, seven of our rescue animals found new homes. In total, from 2011–2019, we successfully rehomed 132 dogs and 69 cats.



Adopting a pet is a rewarding experience and it gives our rescues a second chance at the loving home they deserve. Adoption also means saving two lives – the life of the adopted pet and the life of another animal as people are making room by adopting.

5. Education to raise awareness

Effective animal welfare education can create a sense of compassion, justice, and respect for the value of life. Since 2011, we have been visiting schools and campuses to raise awareness of animal welfare in general.



We are also glad to help university students who bring animal welfare issue up in their final assignments as another way to educate more people through them.

With COVID-19 restricting our reach, our volunteers dedicated their time and knowledge to write useful education articles about various things (responsible ownership, spay-neuter, adoption, etc.) that are currently published on our website.

6. Roadshow

Sponsored by Happy Pet Indonesia, Let's Adopt Indonesia, together with other communities (Rumah Steril, Steril Donk!!, Steril Malabar Bogor, Soulcare.pet, and Planet Satwa) held a roadshow event on 15 September 2019 morning during Car Free Day in Jalan Sudirman, Jakarta, promoting spay and neuter for pets and stray animals.

The event started at 6 a.m. and ended at 10 a.m., and successfully attracted more than 100 people to visit our booth to find out more about the spay and neuter program. Most asked questions related to its benefits, the fee, and whether it is safe enough. We explained everything they would like to know and as an appreciation for them visiting us, we gave them a small packet of Happy Cat/Dog food.

We also received contributions from individuals who supported our cause. A total of Rp1,345,000 was then transferred to Kitabisa.com account as we were running a campaign there.















7. Free Rabies Vaccination

To commemorate World Rabies Day 2019 which fell on September 28, Let's Adopt Indonesia worked together with Pet Kingdom Alam Sutera, one of the most comprehensive pet care centers in Tangerang Selatan, to provide free rabies vaccines to 50 dogs and cats.







Cegah Overpopulasi, 5 Komunitas Adakan Sterilisasi Kucing Liar



JAKARTA SELATAN, AYOJAKARTA.COM -- Semakin banyaknya populasi kucing liar di wilayah Jabodetabek membuat 5 komunitas menggelar sterilisasi guna menekan angka populasi kucing liar yang dapat meresahkan masyarakat.
